Sunday Scripture Reflections – Cycle B

May 5, 2024 – Sixth Sunday of Easter: "God shows no partiality." Peter became aware of this when he recognized the Roman, Cornelius, to be a man of God. Jesus expects his followers to see God in everyone and to love as unselfishly as he did, even to the point of laying down "one's life for one's friends." "Whoever is without love does not know God, for God is love." (Acts 10:25-26, 34-35, 44-48, 1 John 4:7-10, John 15:9-17)

May 9, 2024 – Ascension of our Lord: Jesus promised the Eleven that they would be given the ability to work great wonders and signs in his name. *They were to distribute this glorious heritage freely to the members of the Church.* All this would be possible because of the constant presence of the Holy Spirit. Jesus ascended into heaven and yet through his body, the Church, he continues to work throughout the world. (Acts 1:1-11, Ephesians 1:17-23, Mark 16:15-20)

May 12, 2024 – Seventh Sunday of Easter: The apostles choose a replacement for Judas, who betrayed the Lord. Matthias is now one of the Twelve. He is fully aware that "whoever remains in love remains in God and God in him." With the others he awaits the coming of the Paraclete, the Spirit of Truth who will confirm and consecrate them in the truth. (Acts 1:15-17, 20a, 20c-26, 1 John 4:11-16, John 17:11b-19)

May 19, 2024 – Solemnity of Pentecost: St. Paul urges us to "live by the Spirit." Among the fruits of the Spirit are "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity." What a challenge! If we fail, we can turn with trust to the Lord Jesus, who gives us the gift of forgiveness through the Holy Spirit. (Acts 2:1-11, 1 Corinthians 12:3b-7, 12-13, John 20:19-23)

May 26, 2024 – Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity: Moses told the Israelites, "The Lord is God and there is no other." Jesus' followers also held that God is unique, but they had come to know that in God there are three divine Persons, as we can see in today's passage from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans. Moreover, God has made each of us *his child and heir,* and as we read in the Gospel, the Lord *will be with us until the end of time.* How can we express our gratitude? (Deuteronomy 4:32-34, 39-40, Romans 8:14-17, Matthew 28:16-20)

🔆 Pentecost

ON PENTECOST, we celebrate the day on which the Holy Spirit came upon the disciples in a form resembling tongues of fire, empowering them to proclaim the message that Jesus is risen from the dead. According to Acts of the Apostles (1:13–14), Mary, the apostles, and other disciples had been huddled together in an upper room after the ascension of Jesus. But on this day they went forth from that room as new people, alive in the Spirit, speaking in tongues and winning over believers by the thousands.

A few special features mark the Mass of Pentecost Sunday. The options for the First Reading for Saturday's Vigil Mass, for example, are taken from the Old Testament. Throughout the Easter season, all the readings come from the New Testament—except, of course, the Responsorial Psalm. Saturday's First Reading foreshadows the coming of the Spirit. On Sunday, the First Reading comes from Acts of the Apostles, and it tells the story of Pentecost. After the Second Reading, everyone sings or says the Pentecost Sequence, a special hymn that tells the meaning of this day.

If the priest uses Eucharistic Prayer I, he inserts a special phrase saying that this is the day "on which the Holy Spirit appeared to the Apostles in tongues of fire." The Mass concludes with a double "alleluia." The deacon or priest adds the words to his dismissal, and you answer, "Thanks be to God, alleluia, alleluia." This joyful acclamation concludes the Church's celebration of Easter.

The Paschal candle burns throughout the Pentecost Mass, as it does for the fifty days of Easter Time. After Mass, however, it is moved from its place near the ambo to a position in the baptistry.
