Sunday Scripture Reflections Fr. Bill LaGrand, M.A.

December 1, 2019 – 1st Sunday of Advent: Advent is a season of hope for the good things God has prepared for us. We need to be prepared to receive them. (Isaiah. 2: 1-5)

December 8, 2019 – 2nd Sunday of Advent: God's plan for creation is one free from the strife of sin. The promised king will be like no other. Our task is to turn away from sin and prepare for his coming. (Isaiah 11: 1-10)

December 15, 2019 – 3rd Sunday of Advent (Gaudete Sunday): The vision of our faith can grow dim, but by responding to the rituals of the season and our faith, that vision can be restored. (Matthew 11: 2-11)

December 22, 2019 – 4th Sunday of Advent: We should consider our response to the invitation to each of us to say "Yes" to the dream that God has for the world. Emmanuel comes with hope, peace, and love when each of us shares in fulfilling God's dream. (Matthew 1: 18-24)

December 25, 2019 – The Nativity of the Lord: The throne of David is finally occupied by an ideal, but unconventional king. This king comes in an ordinary way but with extraordinary grace and promise. (Luke 2: 1-14)

December 29, 2019 – Feast of the Holy Family: This family is not at all like our ordinary family. However, when we look at it with a little inspired awareness, we can find a connection between our family and the Holy Family (Matthew 2: 13-15, 19-23)



A new Liturgical Year (Cycle A) begins with the celebration of the 24 days of Advent. Some quotes for us to ponder as we prepare for the celebration of Christ's birth.

An Advent Self-Assessment.

Advent is the perfect time to clear and prepare the Way. Advent is a winter training camp for those who desire peace. By reflection and prayer, by reading and meditation, we can make our hearts a place where a blessing of peace would desire to abide and where the birth of the Prince of Peace might take place.

Daily we can make an Advent examination. Are there any feelings of discrimination toward race, sex, or religion? Is there a lingering resentment, an unforgiven injury living in our hearts? Do we look down upon others of lesser social standing or educational achievement? Are we generous with the gifts that have been given to us, seeing ourselves as their stewards and not their owners? Are we reverent of others, their ideas and needs, and of creation? These and other questions become Advent lights by which we may search the deep, dark corners of our hearts.
