#### SUNDAY SCRIPTURE REFLECTIONS

**March 2, 2025 – 8<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Ordinary Time:** In today's readings, Sirach, Paul and Jesus all urge us to live a life of interior goodness, which will manifest itself exteriorly. Jesus, help us to know ourselves and to correct and interior attitudes that need correction! (Sirach 27:4-7, 1 Corinthians 15:54-58, Luke 6:39-45)

March 5, 2025 – Ash Wednesday: Today is the first day of the Lenten season. We set our course for a forty-day journey. Do we see this as an "acceptable time" for more serious prayer, a well-chosen penitential act, and some specific gift of alms to charity? Whatever we choose, we will keep between our heavenly father and ourselves, offering him our whole heart. (Joel 2:12-18, 2 Corinthians 5:20-6:2, Matthew 6:1-6, 16-18)

March 9, 2025 – 1<sup>st</sup> Sunday of Lent: "What does Scripture say? *The word is near you, in your mouth and in your heart.*" Jesus demonstrates the power of Scripture in the face of temptation. Three time he withstood the very personal affronts of the evil one with the "strong hand and outstretched arm" of God's saving word. May we find wisdom, courage, and love in your holy word. (Deuteronomy 26:4-10, Romans 10:8-13, Luke 4:1-13)

March 16, 2025 – 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday of Lent: God made a covenant with Abram promising that his descendants would become a great nation. Paul encourages fidelity in Christ because our "citizenship is in heaven." There "he will change our lowly body to conform with his glorified body," as revealed to Peter, John and James at the transfiguration. Lord, make us faithful until that day of glory! (Genesis 15:5-12, 17-18, Philippians 3:17-4:1, Luke 9:28b-36)

March 23, 2025 – 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday of Lent: Today, God gives a striking reminder of how necessary it is to repent, to turn and listen to what he says. God manifested the majesty of his Person to the Israelites through Moses, first in the burning bush and then throughout the exodus, yet they strayed. God will sustain us if we are truly repentant and desire to grow in fidelity. (Exodus 3:1-8a, 13-15, 1 Corinthians 10:1-6, 10-12, Luke 13: 1-9)

**March 30, 2025 – 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Lent (Laetare Sunday):** The wayward son, like Isreal of old, found comfort and peace in the loving embrace of his father, and *his reproach was removed.* "All this is from God, who has reconciled us to himself through Christ and given us the ministry of reconciliation." Are we a minister of reconciliation or do we stand aside in reproach like the elder son? (Joshua 5:9a, 10-12, 2 Corinthians 5:17-21, Luke 15:1-3, 11:32)

# **&** Lent

LENT IS the season that prepares us to celebrate Easter. The main reason Lent is important is that Easter is more important. On Easter we celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus Christ, the Son of God, whose passage beyond death into life offers redemption to believers. The Resurrection is the cornerstone of Christian faith. The mystery of Christ's rising from the dead is so deep that the Church invites us to six weeks of preparation before we fully celebrate it. We call that period Lent.

For the faithful, Lent is a time of penitential practices and spiritual discipline. During this time, we acknowledge our sins and seek God's help to overcome them. Traditionally, we engage in acts of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Together these actions show our dependence on God, our renunciation of the fascinations of this world, and our desire to better the lives of others.

For the elect, those preparing for Baptism, Lent is a time of intense spiritual preparation. They will celebrate Baptism at Easter because in this sacrament they enter the mystery of Christ's dying and rising. They die to their former way of life and open their hearts fully to discipleship in Jesus. For the elect, this is a season of purification and enlightenment. The prayers of this season help scrutinize and purify their intentions, removing whatever might block their commitment, and strengthening their resolve. They will become fully illumined with the light of Christ when they celebrate initiation at the Easter Vigil.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and ends before the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday. Ash Wednesday is a day of fast and abstinence. All the Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence.
